Our coastline offers a wealth of choices for the athletic or leisure visitor. Learn more about our coast's hard-earned nickname the "Graveyard of the Atlantic." Canoe or kayak among the inlets or experience a bit of maritime lore at one of our historic lighthouses.

In addition, with more than 70 wineries located from the mountains to the sea, you are never too far away to experience the winemaking process first hand. From chardonnay and cabernet to our native spearmint and muscadine, you can walk a vineyard or explore a winery.

To highlight all that North Carolina has to offer, the N.C. Department of Cultural Resources (www.nculture.com) is sponsoring "Treasure N.C. Culture," which showcases 12,000 years of state culture ranging from contemporary to traditional.

Treasure is not only found in places such as Reed Gold Mine State Historic Site in Midland, the location of the first gold rush in the U.S., but in places like Roanoke Island Festival Park in Manteo and the Southeastern Center for Contemporary Art in Winston-Salem. Literary treasures such as Thomas Wolfe's home in Asheville and historical treasures like Fort Fisher in Kure Beach bring North Carolina's story alive.

More than 1,500 silver state highway historical markers (www.ncmarkers.com) describe the fortunes won and lost, libraries and churches erected, American Indian and African American heritage, the Civil War, the civil rights movement and more. Each marker features Geographic Information System coordinates. Also look for brown signs that lead to 27 state historic sites and seven history museums.

511. Motorists can dial "511" for travel information 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The voice-activated system may also be accessed by dialing 1-877-511-INNC. (For TDD/TTY, call 711 and ask for 1-877-511-4662.)

Incident Management Assistance Patrol. The Incident Management Assistance Patrol is a statewide fleet of 60 drivers who monitor North Carolina's most heavily traveled corridors, assisting stranded motorists and helping clear incidents on the highway. IMAP drivers respond to a variety of needs such as changing flat tires, providing gasoline and moving stalled vehicles out of travel lanes.

Mile Markers. Mile markers, located on highway shoulders, are valuable when referencing specific locations on North Carolina highways. Mile markers begin at 0 at a highway's most southern or western point, and increase heading north or east, depending on the direction of the route. Exit numbers correspond to the nearest mile marker.

AMBER and Silver Alerts. AMBER and Silver Alerts are issued to enlist the public's aid to provide information to law enforcement officials that may result in the safe recovery of an abducted or endangered person. People with helpful information are instructed to dial "HP" (*47) to reach the State Highway Patrol.
