

North Carolina's first modern toll road, the Triangle Expressway in Durham and Wake counties, is now open to traffic and provides a quick and easy alternative to traffic congestion. Tolls are collected electronically, eliminating the need for toll booths. Drivers are encouraged to purchase an NC Quick Pass® transponder from the Turnpike Authority to receive a reduced toll rate. *E-ZPass*® also is accepted at a reduced toll rate. North Carolina's natural diversity and stunning scenery are unrivaled and well represented in its 59 state parks, recreation and natural areas. Between the highest peak east of the Mississippi River at Mount Mitchell State Park and the largest eastern sand dune at Jockey's Ridge State Park, you will find hardwood swamps, long leaf pine forests, mysterious bay lakes, tumbling rivers and much more.

The oldest in the Southeast, North Carolina's state parks system has always been deeply committed to careful conservation of resources. Environmental education is a hallmark of North Carolina's state parks, with free interpretive programs, ranger-led hikes and museum-quality exhibit halls. More than 14 million visitors annually discover that our state parks are "Naturally Wonderful."


